This team will be launching a fundraising campaign for the intent to purchase our current building as well as for needed renovations. Also, our first annual Harvest Sunday was a remarkable success with \$11,000.00 raised toward the ministries of CFC.

2025 Stewardship Team Report

We had another good year for CFC in 2025. We did fall short of our Tithes & Offerings Budget, however, our bank account is in balance and all bills are paid, so no outstanding debts. We also spent less than our Expense Budget, which prevented us from having to move money from the Savings account in order to pay bills.

The Tithes & Offerings Budget was \$413,000 and we ended the year with \$361,785; our expenses were budgeted at \$426,035 and we ended the year with expenditures of \$35,000 less than budgeted at \$390,808.

We are having more people utilizing our online giving through VANCO. The end of December 2025 saw the online giving for the year was over \$100,000 for the second year in a row.

The amounts on our CFC Balance Sheet as of December 31,2025 were as follows:

CFC continues to be blessed by Prayer Park and the Living Waters Prayer Chapel. Thank you, God! During the summer months, we receive 30 or more prayer cards on a weekly basis from those needing prayer. We also receive many comments on the beauty of this area for a place to stop and pray and refresh. We also continue to have engagements and a couple weddings performed at the Prayer Chapel. We also received over \$3,000 in donations toward the Prayer Chapel and we have now filled up our first book of people signing in when they have visited.

We also would like to thank those who contributed to the North Carolina Mission Trip of over \$2,600, to the "Harvest Blessing" project of over \$11,000 and to those who have generously given to our Fund the Future Campaign totaling over \$52,000. The generosity you show for those in need, whether for others or right here at home is greatly humbling and appreciated.

This was my first full year as CFC Treasurer and I have thoroughly enjoyed Kelly serving in this ministry. I have a wonderful team serving along side of me with Ron Frank, Bill Black, Devon Derusha and Craig Savonen, I couldn't have done it without them.

2025 Everence Ministry Report

In 2025 we had Sharing Fund Grant monies of \$3000 and we only used \$187.00 in assisting one family with repairing a vehicle. With the Everence Sharing Fund Grant we receive a 50% match in all qualifying applications to pay back to our Benevolence Fund. **In 2024, ALL congregations received the amount of \$3,000 in Sharing Fund Grant monies** however, in 2025 it was necessary for the Stewardship Team to complete the 4 quarterly reports and the Stewardship Ministry Assessment Tool, of which all were completed, meaning we will again receive \$3000 in Sharing Fund Grant monies. I have spoken to Randy Cadeau, the Spiritual Life Team Chair to alert him to letting me know when our Benevolence Fund is used to help someone in the community or from CFC.

Everence supplies us with the Pastors Salary Guideline for composing the salaries for our Senior and Associate Pastors. This is a huge help in making sure everyone's pay is figured the same way.

Everence held 3 sessions of Webinar Wednesdays in 2025. The first session was in March and the topics were: ***Financial planning with a purpose; Necessary conversations: Let's talk about money; Retirement readiness: Understanding your income options; and Invest in a better world.*** The second session was in September/October and the topics were: ***1) Women, Wealth and Well-being: Creating confidence through the discomfort; 2) Charitable Giving: you know why. We know how. & 3) Annuity Basics.*** The final session was in October/November and those topics were: ***The Longevity Equation: preparing for future of long-term care together; When to utilize an institutional trustee or executor; The ABCs and 123s of Donor Advised Funds; and Investing 101: Get the basics to start your investment journey.*** Everence does a great job on their webinars are very informative. If you would like to watch any of these webinars on your own time, please contact Kelly Roth for the link.

Everence hosted a Medicare Mondays webinar series in 2025, which was held on the second Monday of the month in February & continued through May. Topics will include, when and where to sign up for Medicare, what Medicare covers, plus an explanation of Medicare Parts A, B, C, and D. **Attendance was recommended for those ready to sign up for Medicare.**

A new program for 2025 was the Student Checking Account. Smart banking for your future. **Members could earn up to \$50 when they opened an account & made a deposit.** Whether the youth in their life is starting their first job, building a budget, or just want a debit card that works for them, their new Student Checking Account, is **available to anyone aged 13-22, & gives them the tools to take control of their finances – without fees, minimum balances, or opening deposit amount required. A special promo for 2025 was** Everence would match deposits to a Student Checking Account, dollar for dollar, up to \$50 from October through December 2025.

Everence held 3 separate webinars during 2025. They were: ***Stop making a resolution: Turn your financial goals into reality;*** this was a new webinar to learn strategies to organize your finances, set goals, and improve financial habits. ***Money talk for relationships*** taught communication skills and ground rules for talking about money; common money beliefs and scripts and how they influence financial behavior; and money management strategies that could be implemented on your own or with others. ***Financial Fraud in the Church: Best practices for prevention and mitigation*** explored ways your congregation can greatly lessen fraud's likelihood and what to do if it happens. This webinar was ideal for pastors, stewardship advocates, treasurers and other congregational leaders.

Everence hosted five sets of webinars for the Stewardship Partners and I participated in all of the webinars as head of the Stewardship Team. The five webinars were Stewardship Steps: Moving your Stewardship Ministry forward in 2025. Step 1: ***Telling your church's story*** – Telling your story is not only about connecting your church's vision for ministry, it's also about uncovering stories of how God is touching the lives of those within your community of faith; and then finding ways to retell those stories to your community of faith may be blessed and inspired. Step 2: ***Teaching & Preaching Stewardship*** – Teaching and preaching about stewardship helps people grow in the spiritual practices of money management and generosity. It also helps people navigate their own financial journey, no matter their life stage or income and asset level. Step 3: ***Asking for Involvement*** – People think of stewardship primarily as managing money

well. However, stewardship also encompasses a spirit of generosity that shapes and expands how we share God's love. As church leaders, we help shape disciples' understanding of how to respond generously to the generous God we serve.

Step 4: **Thanking Givers** – "Saying thank you is a critical component of your stewardship efforts and allows you to model gratitude to the congregation." Modeling gratitude conveys a message from leadership that we see and acknowledge your valuable contributions you are making to our church. When you thank people, they feel valued and appreciated. Step 5: **Planning for the Future** – The role of planning for the stewardship leaders is crucial in laying a foundation that builds a connection to what God is attempting to do in your community. Planning helps create a roadmap that provides a framework and direction for creating and cultivating a healthy and growing stewardship culture.

In November, Everence holds a Client Appreciation Event for Everence members and Advocates. The 2025 Theme for the event was **The Power of Saying Thank you!** I am not only the CFC Everence Advocate, I am an Everence member, holding a checking & saving account and the Everence My Neighbor credit card. Everence is always excited to celebrate their Everence members, advocates, pastors, and clients. They hold a time of fellowship with Everence members and staff, learning about ways Everence is serving advocates, hearing appreciation stories from the Everence team, and they also have giveaways, prizes and more!

I am looking forward to 2026 and what God has in store for us! Please continue to pray for the Financial Stewardship Team as we move forward through the Everence ministry in 2025.

Music Ministry 2025

The music ministry team at CFC is an active participant in each Sunday Worship service. 21 singers and instrumentalists were active on the team in 2025. We also work closely with approximately 6 technicians (sound, video, lights, computer) that rotate and share the duties on Sunday mornings. I am grateful for the people that offer to share their gifts of singing, playing instruments and technical support- this is a group ministry and a calling. I am especially thankful for Eric Lytle, who stepped up to lead worship while I was on vacation and to Duane Krenok and Ally Loebach who covered the piano in my absence. Giving others the chance to lead/play builds up new leaders and blesses them and the congregation. I schedule teams 1-2 months ahead and send out a schedule. I work to make sure everyone gets the opportunity to serve each month.

Each week, after I select the music, I send the written music to those on the team that week and also text a YouTube playlist which includes each song to listen to, with the idea that each team member prepares at home before we meet to practice on Sunday mornings. On Sundays, the tech team is the first to arrive at church so we are ready for the instrumentalists to begin at 8:40am and then the singers join us at 9:00am. As worship director, I choose the weekly service music, arrange the music, create paper and electronic copies of the music, communicate weekly with the praise team, create the Sunday PowerPoints, create pre-service Countdown videos, put together the Order of Worship, keep records of all music sung at any of our services, report to CCLI the music we perform (when required to do so), help in planning the Advent Series and any special services that require music, rehearse the music each week and finally perform the worship music by playing piano, singing and leading the worship team during the Sunday morning service. When available, I also rehearse, put together teams and play for funerals. The music is prayerfully chosen to support the message or theme for the week, and I am in contact with Pastor Tim (or whoever is speaking) each week.

This year I started to share a Facebook Music post each week. I make a YouTube playlist of the songs we will be singing (I try to use lyric videos) and Kelly posts this list to our Facebook page. The thought is, anyone who wants to prepare for Sunday or just worship with our songs for the week can take part.

We had a variety of special music this year including vocal solos/duets, instrumental solos and ensembles. We had a special Christmas Service that included the entire Praise Team on the 3rd Sunday of advent.

Our Music Ministry is a blessing to those who participate, and I believe to our congregation as well. Our goal on the worship team is to point to God in worship in such a way that God is glorified and the people feel drawn to worship and experience God's presence. We strive to be true worshippers, and not just leaders.

Typically, the fund will use \$500-\$1500 depending on the needs of the students. Some examples of where the funds have been dispersed in the past include:

Basketball shoes

Pay to participate fees

Doctor Co-pays & Office Calls

Dentist Bills

Money for out-of-town meals for athletes with no parental support

This year the fund was used very little.

Steel toe boots for a student so he could take the welding class at school was the only purchase.

Thank you all so much for your continued support of this fund. It makes an impact on both the teachers and the students.

Mission Report for 2025

Our mission team members included: Carol Norman, chairperson, Steve and Stephanie Anable, Cyndi Bosman and Lester Livermore. This past year we have had several people resign from the mission team including Cyndi Bosman, Steve and Stephanie Anable. Carol Norman has decided to step down from Mission Chair and is happy to announce that Lisa Wallace will be taking over for 2026. Carol will remain on the mission team.

Beauty for Ashes: Currently budgeted for \$4000.00

Beauty for Ashes has been able to continue to reach out to the at risk women in the Flint area. These women have been involved in prostitution, some have come out of being trafficked. The organization has been able to hold fund raisers with much success. Since Brainna Thompson resigned to be a stay at home mom the staff duties and management is run by their board with Hannah Standard as president of the board.

Beauty for Ashes is a ministry dedicated to bringing hope and healing for a new and empowered life through the love of Jesus. We minister to women who are survivors of human trafficking and those at risk of sexual exploitation and addiction.

87.2 of monies received go to program expenses and 12.8 goes to cover administrative expenses.

Continue to keep them in prayer as they serve the women in the Flint area to bring them out of prostitution, drug abuse and give them Beauty for Ashes.

Big Life: We supported Big Life with a gift of \$2500.00 in 2025. We had a pastor from India come to speak to our congregation as well as his daughter. He delivered a wonderful message.

The administrative costs for big life ministries can vary significantly. Generally, administrative costs are considered to be below 15% of total expenses for most charities, but this can differ based on the specific ministry and its operational structure. For example, some ministries may have administrative costs as high as 43.1% of their expenses. It's important to note that these costs can include salaries, rent, and other operational expenses that support the ministry's overall functions.

The administrative salaries for Big Life International Ministries are not explicitly detailed in the available sources. However, general salary information for similar organizations indicates:

The average annual salary for employees at Big Life in the United States is \$80,439. Salaries typically range from \$70,330 to \$92,027 annually, depending on the role and experience. The highest-paid position is the Chief Executive Officer, with an average salary of approximately \$622,669 per year.

For more specific salary details, it may be beneficial to consult the company's official resources or salary surveys.

Big Life attests to having a baptism every 8 minutes, serves 180 countries with 70+ have disciple making ministries and they distribute 1100 Bibles daily.

Compass Pregnancy and Family Resource Center (Previously CareNet):

We budgeted \$4000.00 for Compass in 2025. Compass is supporter funded including over 30 churches in the Eastern UP. Funding is also provided by individuals, community organizations and businesses. They receive no government funding. They are also debt free.

The name change came about as to better represent the services offered while remaining true to their mission. Focus remains on supporting abortion minded and vulnerable women. They also are able to serve parents and children through parenting programs that can have a significant impact on future generations.

The pregnancy center continues to provide ultrasounds. The Crib provides needed items for babies and young children.

There is a medical director over the center, this is has what enables them to offer ultrasounds and pregnancy tests.

CounterAct (previously Orphan Helpers): Orphan Helpers received \$2500.00 as part of our budget for 2025. This program works with equipping incarcerated and released youth for a change life across the Northern Triangle of Central America.

Youth are trapped in a relentless and vicious cycle of adversity.

Incarcerated youth in Central America see little hope for their future. They often find themselves imprisoned for crimes they've been groomed or coerced to commit. Life behind bars is bleak, and their options after release are limited: return to a life of crime, face an early death, or attempt to flee the country.

Without an education, job opportunities, and someone to believe in them, they are vulnerable to exploitation and reincarceration. After a lifetime of severe adversities, they can't envision an alternative future. And when their holistic needs go unmet, this cycle of generational trauma and brokenness repeats.

I could not find any information about how much goes to administrative fees however I did find this information Counteract International does not specify the exact administrative fees for their ministry. However, the organization is known for its holistic approach to equipping incarcerated and released youth, which includes mentorship, life skills training, and biblical guidance. The organization's mission is to help youth embrace a new trajectory for their life through consistent mentorship and support. counteract.org For more detailed information on the administrative fees and how they are used, it is recommended to contact Counteract International directly or visit their official website. I did check the website and they did not list anything in regards to how much is spent on administrative fees.

Eden Childrens' village: Eden ministries is budgeted for \$3900.00 in 2025.

Our primary focus is on providing a loving and secure home for orphans, rooted in the values and teachings of our Christian faith. Beyond orphan care, we actively engage in ministry initiatives, seeking to follow the example of Christ in every way.

Susan and Kevin Fry spoke at our church in October as they were visiting their supporters throughout the US.

The administrative costs for Eden Ministries in Zimbabwe are essential for sustaining their operations, which include:

Day-to-day activities: This encompasses feeding children, maintaining homes, transportation, salaries, utilities, maintenance, and repairs.

Operational funds: These are crucial for the overall functioning and sustainability of the ministry, enabling the provision of a stable environment for the children under care.

Annual campaigns: For example, the "Feed the Village" campaign focuses on agricultural food production costs, which supports the ministry's efforts in providing essential nutrition to the community.

Financial breakdown can be obtained on their website.

Engadine Consolidate Schools: This amount was decreased to \$1800.00 for 2025. They did not require the previously \$3000.00 budgeted amount,. The money for this is for kids in need of any types of clothing or needs. Debbie DeWyse oversees this mission.

Ghana Christian Missions: Ghana Christian Missions is provided with \$2500.00 per year. Wisdom Nyador is the director. He and his wife Rebbekah had the opportunity to come and share about Ghana Christian Missions with us. I have had the opportunity to serve twice in Ghana and to see how their mission works through sharing the love of Christ and discipling the African people.

Ghana Christian Mission (GCM) is dedicated to sharing the Gospel and providing community support through church planting, medical outreach, and education initiatives in Ghana.

Mission and Activities: Ghana Christian Mission aims to spread the hope of the Gospel to all people in Ghana, focusing on both spiritual and physical needs. Their key areas of work include:

Church Planting - GCM has established numerous churches across Ghana, providing a place for worship and community support. They have started 185 churches, helping to foster local congregations and spiritual growth.

Medical Outreach - The mission operates seven medical clinics in rural areas, offering essential healthcare services while sharing the Gospel. These clinics serve as safe spaces for individuals to receive medical care and spiritual guidance.

Christian Education - GCM has initiated three schools to provide a Christian environment for children, addressing the need for education in a country where schooling is not free. This initiative aims to improve educational access and promote Christian values among the youth.

Community Development -GCM is involved in various community development projects, including job skills training and agricultural education, which help improve living standards and provide families with sustainable income sources. They also engage in outreach programs that support orphans, widows, and disabled individuals, helping them to find hope and purpose through faith and practical assistance.

Financial information can be obtained on their website.

Global Health Outreach: Global health outreach is supported by prayer and also service on the mission field by Carol Norman. There is also room for others to join on any of these mission trips. This is not supported with the missions budget however many of the church family has supported Carol on these trips with financial support and money.

Healing Loft: This ministry was budgeted with \$750.00. They are no longer a presence in the Upper Peninsula. The director has moved to Lower Michigan. .

Illuminate: Illuminate is a youth mission program that works with youth in Newberry. They receive \$1500.00 in missions funds. The Illuminate youth did come to CFC worship center to participate in worship and share testimonies.

Keryx: Keryx is a new mission that we took on in 2024. Keryx is budgeted \$2500.00 per year. This ministry works with community Keryx weekends and helps those who are incarcerated return to a normal life when they leave prison or jail. This ministry has seen a lot of change this past year. The person who was overseeing the community aspect of Keryx had relocated their ministry to the Iron Mountain area and took all of the funding with him. While we supported primarily the prison aspect, given the change and effect it had on the community Keryx it was recommended for 2026 for the funding to go directly to the local Keryx in Community. There were a total of 4 retreats held in the Eastern UP this past year, 2 for men and 2 for women. There was also a message by Chad Gouza and testimonies from those who have attended Keryx.

Lingap: We continue to support Lingap Children's Foundation in the Phillipines with \$2500.00 in financial support. This organization is one that others through- out the country are trying to emulate. Our support of them has been a true blessing.

This charity's score is 97%, earning it a Four-Star rating. If this organization aligns with your passions and values, you can give with confidence.

Living Hope: Living Hope Ministries in Ontario, Canada, focuses on encouraging and developing local churches that serve First Nations communities. Their mission includes:

Worshiping in full devotion and attracting seekers.

Mobilizing believers and restoring families. Changing communities and affecting the world positively.

They provide various services such as worship services, support programs, Bible studies, and outreach opportunities for all ages.

Our financial support to Living Hope is \$3200.00. We have not had anyone come to speak from Living Hope ministries. This would be a goal for 2026.

Love INC: Many from our congregation continue to volunteer at Love Inc. Our gift to them is \$3800.00 per year. Karen spoke to our church family this past year. They also had a celebration on their anniversary. They have been able to hire an extra person to help with social issues of those in the community. Our church family has also helped Love INC financially in addition to what is given through missions.

Sunshine Foundation: Sunshine foundation is a community which works with people with developmental disabilities. We support them through missions with an amount of \$500.00 as well as the money that is collected in our birthday bank. A person from the Sunshine Foundation did come and speak at our church.

Time to Revive: This program partners with local churches and leaders across the nation. They have a passion for making disciples and a call for repentance. We provide \$3100.00 to support their mission. Pastor Tim, Chad and Eric were able to meet with them this year. Time to Revive also had a big presence in Chicago reaching out to the people there. Scott was planning to come to speak this past fall however due to Nikki's continue health problems was not able to do so.

Undesignated Mission: \$2000.00 is set aside for the undesignated mission funds. There have been several outreach trips to help in areas devastated by the weather including 2 trips to North Carolina and Gaylord, Michigan.

Youth Mission Fund: The youth mission fund is gifted with \$2000.00 per year. Our youth have been very impactful in collecting and putting shoeboxes together for Samaritan's Purse to be distributed around the world. They also traveled to Wisconsin to help finish up the project prior to the shoeboxes being sent.

Total missions funding for 2025 was \$47, 250.00

We have added an increase of \$7000.00. While there has been some concern that our mission's budget does not reach 15% of our 2025 total budget, we need to take into consideration that we were not going to increase this year due to the additional expenses for our church budget which included the hiring of 2 assistant pastors.

I would also like to add that the amount that is budgeted comes out of what our tithes and offerings for the year. It does not include other areas where "the church" comes forward and donates to other areas. The amount of money donated to the Hurricane Relief to Samaritan's Purse and Heart for the House exceeded \$30,000 combined. We as the church also give to other missions. Many of us who go on mission trips are assisted by the congregation to offset expenses or provide for our own expenses. Many also support missions by sponsoring a child, giving to other missions. Also we need to include the time that is given in supporting missions, going on mission trips, taking personal time off from work etc. Time is as valuable resource as the dollars that are given. Also there is a lot of mission work that goes on at the Living Water's Prayer Chapel.
